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Right: An 'Echo II' with its distinctive Snoop Slab air surveillance radar in the raised position. The submarine has a damaged bow. (MoD)

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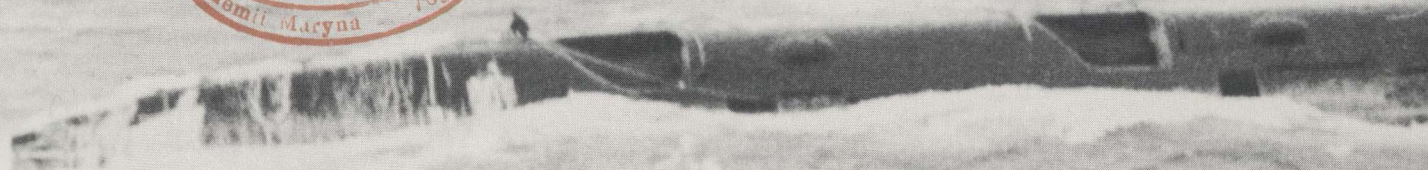
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
